Africa has the youngest population in the world of **226 million people** aged between 15 & 24.

It is anticipated that the number will increase by **42% by 2030 & 50% by 2055.**

Lack of employment opportunities, low levels of education and skills combined with limited access to sexual and reproductive health services, have resulted in a generation of young people with almost no association to the formal job market.



5 key Goals of Youth Connekt

- Create 10 million Jobs
- Empower 25 million with skills
- Nurture 1 million young leaders
- Connect 100 million young Africans
- Close gender gap.





Bridging the gap between the different nations by bringing together government leaders & policy influencers implementing youth policies to share knowledge & ideas that can assist others in achieving their own goals for their youth.

Identifying existing programs aligned to Youth Connekt goals and facilitate a platform to work together to achieve our common goals. These programs will further assist in measuring, monitoring & maintaining successful initiatives aligned to Youth Connekt objectives.

Seeking partnerships with private sector, government institutions & NGOs that will be responsible for helping deliver programs, bringing other partners on board, innovating & providing solutions for implementation challenges.

Launch of YouthConnekt Hub & YouthConnekt Empowerment Fund

- The summit marked the launch of the **YouthConnekt Africa Hub** and the **YouthConnekt Africa Empowerment Fund.**
 - The YouthConnekt Africa Hub will offer regional support to national YouthConnekt Programmes
 - The YouthConnekt Africa Empowerment Fund is an initiative to empower young people in Africa to impact their communities. Supported by private sector, donors, national governments, foundations and civil society organizations, the Fund will offer regional support to Youth empowerment initiatives.

Key Highlights



How do we get to 50 million jobs?

Africa faces numerous challenges in ensuring inclusive growth, particularly among the youth demographic, which continues to grow each day as the majority. Today, 200 million of the 1.2 billion Africans are youth aged between 15 and 24 years. It is essential that we urgently tackle youth unemployment in order to fully realize Africa's potential.

The participants discussed the top challenges hindering youth employment and what opportunities i.e. policy, programs and partnerships can address these challenges.

- Access to finance/ capital
- Women empowerment and inclusion
- Wealth creating sectors that are untapped by the youth Agriculture, manufacturing
- Access to basic infrastructure (electricity and internet)

Main highlights:

- AfDB committed to host and support the next edition of YouthConnekt Africa summit
- IBDL foundation committed to avail 1000 scholarships for 21 countries.

Youth driving SDGs

Over several decades, the boom in exports of natural resources has penalized industrialization in Africa.

The continent experienced stagnation, even a decline, in the industrial and manufacturing sectors since the 1970s. Elsewhere, industrialization has played a key role in lifting millions of people out of poverty by providing them with decent and secure jobs.

This session centered around what Africa can do to rectify its development trajectory and to make economic development more inclusive.

Main highlights:

- Youth initiatives that have contributed to Africa' SDG mandate were discussed (Accelerate 2030, Ms.Geek Africa, Africa Prize for Engineering, African Youth Alliance on SDGs, Young people with disabilities initiatives, etc.)
- Policies aimed to educate, empower & support youth initiatives that positively impacts Africa's SDG mandate with the intention of weaving them into the YouthConnekt Africa program.

Demographic Dividend: How Can We Win?

Session Lead: ONE Campaign

Africa's population is projected to double by 2050 (2 billion) yet we are optimistic about maximizing the anticipated labor force. The session centered around the following questions:-

- How shall this population growth impact Africa's demographic transition?
- What challenges are retarding the continent from realizing the demographic dividend?
- What investments must we make to in our youth to reap the benefits of this resource opportunity?

Commitment:

• Support the next YouthConnekt Africa summit and use the platform to award the winner of ONE award, a USD 100,000 award given to an outstanding organization based in Africa which is working towards the end of extreme poverty.

Connekted girls: Implementing The Smart Women & Girls Declaration

Girl Effect Rwanda, in collaboration with partners, hosted the Connekted Girls Session at the YouthConnekt Africa Summit. The session aimed to challenge mindsets, drive discussions and create a set of recommendations around the implementation of the recently launched Smart Africa Women and Girls' Declaration.

Connekted Girls featured inspirational speakers from Rwanda and across Africa, who shared their stories of how they have been empowered by digital skills and how they participate in the field of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM).

Key recommendation:

- The mindset of both men and women need to change if we are to create truly gender equitable societies.
 Investment in social behavior change communication can support a shift in the mindset of families,
 communities and policymakers.
- Investments need to be made to ensure that digital solutions can work in low-tech and low-connectivity
 environments. We need to incentivize technology companies that can help overcome barriers and
 challenges that hold hard-to-reach and rural communities, especially women, back.
- We need to make the outcomes real. When actions are combined with entrepreneurialism we start to see actual returns. It is important to combine the worlds of technology development with entrepreneurialism.

Harnessing Youth's Potential through Health

This session focused on young people's access to sexual and reproductive health information and services as a prerequisite and one of the drivers of harnessing the Demographic Dividend in Africa. The session also highlighted regional challenges to realizing young people's reproductive rights, by using real - life testimonies or appeals from activists (from Rwanda or abroad) and why a multi-sectoral approach is critical to making progress.

Discussions centered around:-

- Impact of lack of Sexuality Education and access to SRH services on adolescent pregnancies, HIV infection
- Effect of harmful practices on adolescent girls (child marriage, FGM from country that still practice) linking to missed opportunities in education, economic and social
- How low income or no income impact to Adolescent sexual & reproductive health and rights



Enterprise Hub

The session aimed to mobilize young entrepreneurs coming from the UNCTAD's Empretec, the International Trade Centre, the Commonwealth and the Francophonie networks. They prepared to exercise the famous elevator pitch in front of the young audience followed by exchanges with corporate leaders, impact investors and philanthropists on how new products and policies can be introduced to create new business opportunities in Africa with impact on development.

Outcomes

- Mr. Tonye Coyle, CEO Sahara Group pledged 75,000 USD for a "Next Step Fund" to help young entrepreneurs to scale up after starting the business.
- Hon .Margaret Mwanakatwe, Minister of Commerce, Trade and Industry, Zambia engaged to host a YouthConnekt Forum in Zambia and to pursue collaboration with the Youth Connekt Africa Hub
- UNCTAD and Commonwealth will continue collaboration on youth entrepreneurship policies and will
 produce a policy brief on social entrepreneurship by the end of 2017
- UNCTAD and OIF will continue collaboration and co-organize and host a study tour for a delegation from Cameroun to visit incubators in France and Rwanda by the end of 2017
- UNCTAD and the Rwanda Development Board have reviewed the possibility to co-organize a regional workshop on entrepreneurship policies.
- UNCTAD and UNDP have agreed to collaborate for the establishment of an Empretec centre in Rwanda and engage partnerships for the Youth Connekt Africa Hub

Meet the Leaders- Expanding opportunities for Youth

YouthConnekt Africa is about nurturing and empowering Africa's youth through job creation (Employment and Entrepreneurship), skills development and political engagement to effectively reduce the growing unemployment rate among this demographic.

The discussion centered around how governments can ensure an enabling environment for youth empowerment so they can effectively contribute Africa's development.

Key areas of discussion included employment/ entrepreneurship challenges and opportunities for youth and how exactly the youth can participate, beyond rhetoric?



Meet the Leaders- Expanding opportunities for Youth

Commitments from UNDP - UNDP will provide technical and financial support to the establishment of the Regional Hub here in Kigali and the design of the YouthConnekt Africa Innovation and Empowerment Fund; and UNDP will partner with the Government of Rwanda and the AfDB to co-host the next YouthConnekt Africa Summit.

Commitments from Jack Ma:-

- 100- 200 African young entrepreneurs will work at Alibaba headquarters in fields including; e-commerce,
 Artificial intelligence and Internet each year.
- Alibaba will work with Universities in Africa and governments to train specific courses including; Internet,
 Artificial intelligence, and e-commerce.
- In partnership with Paradise foundation, Alibaba will launch an Africa wide conservation fund.
- Alibabe will set up a 10 Million dollar fund for African entrepreneurs.





Excerpts from closing speeches – Hon Jean P Nsengimana

Excerpt 1

"We have learned a lot over the last 2 days. We know know where the 50 million jobs that Africa needs to create by 2020 will come from - agribusiness, industry, internet - but my favorite is the formula of Success that has 4 ingredients: Leadership, Technology, Entrepreneurship and Innovation - with Youth Inside."

Excerpt 2

"In a ministerial session that took place yesterday, Ministers, Representatives of the Partner organizations and youth decided to establish Africa's YouthConnekt Hub and Youth Empowerment Fund here in Kigali and requested Your Excellency's guidance and support on this. We decided to base it on the formula of Success translated into 4 P: Policies, Projects, Partnership, Profits"

Excerpt 3

"Zambia and Benin committed to launch YouthConnekt intiative very soon and join a growing network that comprise already Liberia, Sierra Leone, Congo Brazzaville, DRC, Uganda and Swaziland. The Premier of the Free State Province, Mr. Magashule who led a big team from South Africa committed to champion this initiative in South Africa and Lesotho. UNDP decided to put resources in the Fund as well as in a study to determine the legal and corporate structure of the hub and Fund."
